Technical/Medical/Legal Language from ER TV Show:

Take a look at the attached side:

- 1. Using Logic/Story technique, construct the linear logic/narrative of the short scene.
- 2. Identify any terms/words/phrases you can't define...and then define them. Note: it is also possible to simply turn these terms into images using loci/mp, but this is time consuming and still doesn't help you understand what you are talking about. Logic/Story and defining the terms for yourself will always give you a deeper understanding. For ex: Looking up OB (obstetrics), pelvic (exam), GSWs (gun show wounds) gives you a sense of urgency and specificity...researching "pulse ox 95," "BP 90/60," and "pulse 120" would help you conclude that their patient had a) low oxygen, b) low blood pressure, and c)high pulse rate. Additional notations are included in a separate attached doc.
- 3. Identify cue lines, link them, and drill them.
